The Innovation Technology department is pleased to announce the deployment of the new Voice over Internet Phone (VoIP) system this Thursday, April 25.


As part of the new VoIP system, the Mitel Connect application allows users to manage their phones from their computer, a sample dialog box is included below. The new VoIP system has an Outlook feature that allows users to sync their Exchange Calendar with Mitel Connect, and switch availability state accordingly (i.e. In a Meeting).

Users have the option to opt out, if they wish.

Additional features include Call routing, Voicemail notification, and Call history logs.

On April 13-14, the Recreation & Community Services Department, together with the Cupertino Teen Commission, hosted the third year of <hack> Cupertino, a 13-hour overnight hackathon for young innovators, aspiring coders, and developers to bring their ideas to fruition. "Life hacks" was the theme of this year's event and participants were tasked with designing a website, software, or application that would bring ease to or streamline an aspect of everyday life.
