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General City News and Updates


City Communications Regarding COVID-19 (Coronavirus)

The City of Cupertino continues to monitor the effects of the coronavirus (COVID-19) as the safety of our residents remains our highest priority. All City facilities remain closed until further notice. While City Hall is closed to the public, the City continues to provide essential services online at <u>cupertino.org</u> and by phone at (408) 777-3200. These essential services include responding to 311 requests and maintaining the City's infrastructure, among others. City's New E-Notification System Goes Live

The City of Cupertino has successfully rolled out GovDelivery, the City's new electronic notification system. The City now sends e-notifications to its residents and other individuals who have subscribed to receive email notifications on various City topics via this new platform. The new system replaces GovAccess, the City website's e-notification module.

The new system has consolidated the design and delivery of all electronic communications from the City, including email notifications and various electronic newsletters under this new platform. This new solution also provides better subscriber tracking and reporting functionality. Commission secretaries, along with department and topic administrators, can now use Cityapproved templates to send notifications on City meetings, news, projects, publications, and jobs spanning multiple topics to subscribers.



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The implementation of GovDelivery reinforces the City's ongoing initiative to provide transparent communications that are timely and cost-effective to keep our community informed. The Applications Division of the City's Innovation Technology Department collaborated with the Office of Communications on the new system.

Pavement Improvement Projects Begin

Asphalt Work Begins on Bollinger Road

The City's contractor, O'Grady Paving Inc., began work to place an asphalt overlay on Bollinger Road between Miller Avenue and Lawrence Expressway on Tuesday, October 6. Work consists of milling of the asphalt surface, placement of a new asphalt surface course, raising utilities to grade, and replacement of asphalt striping. Work is expected to be completed by mid-November.

Traffic will be reduced to one lane of travel in each direction between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Travelers are advised to expect delays and the use of alternate routes is advised.

2020 Pavement Maintenance Phase 2

Work has begun on the 2020 Pavement Maintenance Phase 2 Project by the City's contractor, O'Grady Paving Inc. Work consists of a rubberized asphalt overlay on Bollinger Road from Miller Avenue and 100' west of Lawrence Expressway. The contractor is scheduled to grind the existing asphalt surface from October 6 through October 10 and place a new asphalt surface course from October 13 through October 16. Additional work includes adjusting utility covers to finish grade and replacement of asphalt striping and legends. Traffic will be reduced to one lane in each direction of travel while work is in progress. The project also includes a rubberized asphalt cape seal on McClellan Road from Bubb Road to approximately 200' east of Stelling Road. The rubberized chip seal is tentatively scheduled for October 19 and 20, followed by micro-surfacing on October 26 and 27. The work has been coordinated with the schools, even with schools closed to in-person learning due to COVID-19.

Motorists should expect delays while work is in progress and are advised to use alternate routes whenever possible. All work is expected to be completed by November 16.

City Playgrounds Open

The City of Cupertino reopened park playgrounds on Monday, September 21. The City will not be sanitizing play structure surfaces, so use at your own risk. Playground users should follow social distancing recommendations, wear face coverings, practice good hygiene, and follow the regulations put forth by the California Department of Public Health.

Regulations include:

- Face coverings must be worn by everyone two years of age or older.
- Do not use the playground when different households are unable to maintain a physical distance of six feet.
- Members of separate households must remain at least six feet apart at all times.

- Consider going at different times or days to avoid crowds.
- No eating or drinking on the playground to ensure face masks are worn at all times.
- Wash or sanitize hands before and after using the playground.
- Elderly and persons with underlying medical conditions should avoid the playground when others are present.
- Limit visit to 30 minutes per day when others are present.

Give Feedback on Waste Collection Services

The City of Cupertino's current agreement with Recology for the collection of recyclables, organics, and garbage expires January 31, 2021, and City Council has authorized Cupertino staff to negotiate with Recology for a new 10-year agreement. As staff negotiates the new agreement, input from residents and businesses is very important. The City invites you to provide feedback through several opportunities:

Refinancing of City Certificates of Participation

The City of Cupertino had \$27.1 million in outstanding debt (Certificates of Participation) as of June 30. Given current market conditions, the City was interested in refinancing the outstanding debt at a lower interest rate to achieve annual savings through the July 1, 2030 maturity date of the Certificates.

On September 29, the City of Cupertino 2020A Certificates of Participation (2020 COPs) were successfully sold at very attractive interest rates in order to refund the City's 2012 Certificates of Participation for debt service savings. The 2020 COPs were very well received by investors due in large part to the well-regarded Cupertino name, the top-notch AA+ rating, the sizable annual


principal amounts and short maturity, and favorable supply and demand dynamics in the California municipal market.

At the end of the order period, there were nearly eight times as many orders as there were bonds for sale. This strong investor demand enabled the underwriter to further lower yields. The refunding ultimately generated net present value savings of approximately \$3.14 million, or 11.61% of refunded par (compared to \$2.26 million, or 8.36% of refunded par, when presented to City Council on September 15) and a True Interest Cost of 0.72%. Savings to the City's General Fund amounts to approximately \$494,000 per year for the next 10 years, or almost \$5 million in total savings.

The bond sale was accomplished within eight weeks of kicking off the refinancing process, and the 2020 COPs are expected to close on October 22.

Coastal Cleanup Day

The City of Cupertino's Environmental and Sustainability teams took time on September 28 to pick up litter in Calabazas Creek. Usually, creek cleanup volunteer events at Creekside Park bring over 90 volunteers from the community to help clean up litter in the creek in May and September. However, due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, this year's events were cancelled. City staff went out to clean up and collected over 30 pounds of litter. Some notable items included an arrow and several boba cups.



The City encouraged individuals, families, and households to safely participate in cleaning up litter during the entire month of September by promoting the Creek Connections Action Group's virtual coastal cleanups. While Creek Cleanup Month has come to an end, everyone is encouraged to continue picking up litter in their own neighborhoods to help keep Cupertino streets and creeks clean.

Business Updates

Santa Clara County Allows Facial Services to Resume

Services that require removal of a client's face covering (such as facials) may now be performed with modifications and proper use of personal protective equipment. Clients and visitors must wear a face covering at all times at the facility, but clients may remove face coverings while receiving a personal care service indoors or outdoors. These personal care services are those that require removal of a face covering such as: facial hair removal or treatment; beard trimming or face shaving; facials and face massages; facial tattoos and facial tattoo removal; facial piercing; application or removal of face makeup; and other personal care services to the extent they require the client to remove or adjust a face covering.

Clients may remove face coverings only for the minimum time and to the minimum degree necessary to receive the service. Clients must put their face covering back on as soon as they are able to, and must wear a face covering while waiting for their service, walking to and from the treatment area, visiting the restroom, and at all other times while at the facility.

N95 masks are required for workers providing any service for which the client cannot wear a face covering during the procedure.
