

Cupertino Safe Routes to School



Elementary School Pedestrian Education Pilot Program

Learning how to walk safely is an important life skill that is not currently being taught in Cupertino schools. Cupertino's Safe Routes to School program would like to introduce pedestrian education (ped-ed) into its elementary schools because, at this age, walking is the most common form of alternative transportation. This pedestrian education would supplement CUSD's curriculum and will be offered to Cupertino schools free-of-charge.

To determine the most effective ped-ed model for our Cupertino community, we will be conducting a ped-ed pilot program this fall. With the participation of five schools, this pilot program will evaluate two different ped-ed vendors, Ecology Action and Safe Moves, and specifically, the various pedestrian education components that they offer.

As part of this process, we will be forming a committee of Safe Routes to School stakeholders to help evaluate each vendor's respective programs. The primary purpose of this committee is to develop guidelines regarding a preferred ped-ed model for the City of Cupertino.
