



Bike Rodeo!

Bike Rodeo

Regnart Elementary School

Event Overview

Kids often start learning how to ride a bike when they are elementary school age. They need practice and a safe environment to learn. The Regnart Bike Rodeo is educational and also a lot of fun.

- Bike Rodeo is usually scheduled on early dismissal day
- We schedule 1.5 hours, but it could be less
- We usually have between 80 100 participants
- Bike and helmet check/pump/repair
- Games
- Prizes/treats

WEAR A HELMET

Getting the Fit Just Right

Bicycling is a fun and healthy way to get around. Before you roll, safety should be your goal!

Wearing a helmet reduces head injuries when riding a bicycle, scooter, skateboard or skates. California law requires anyone under the age of 18 to wear a properly fitted and fastened helmet when doing the above activities. Everyone, including parents, should wear a helmet for every ride. MAKE IT A HABIT!

A helmet needs to fit properly to be effective at reducing head injuries in a crash. Follow the four easy steps for the right fit: SNUG, EYES, EARS, MOUTH,



SNUG

- Adjust the tension mechanism at the back of the helmet or replace the pad inserts, if available, until the helmet fits snugly around your head.
- If you cannot get a snug fit around your head, your helmet won't protect you in a crash. You may need to purchase a different size helmet and consider one with a tension adjuster.



EYES

- · Place your helmet level on your head so you are able to see the helmet rim when you look up.
- There should be no more than two finger-widths between your eyebrows and the rim of the helmet.



EARS

Adjust the straps so they make a "Y" that meets just below your ears.



MOUTH

- Adjust the chinstrap so that no more than two fingers fit between the strap and your chin while fastened.
- While snug, you should still be able to open your mouth comfortably while fastened.

CHOOSING THE RIGHT HELMET

Below are suggestions for choosing the right type of helmet for popular activities:



Bike Helmet

- Bicycling
- Scootering
- Skating



Multi-Sport Helmet

- Skateboarding
- Scootering
- Skating

TIPS

- · Replace your helmet if it has been in a crash or if it is older than 4 years.
- Never buy a used helmet.
- When it's time for a new helmet, bring your child to choose the right style and fit.
- Look for the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) certification sticker.
- · Remove your hat before putting on your helmet.

Now that you know how to properly fit a helmet, wear it on every ride, follow the rules of the road, and have FUN!

Organizing the Rodeo

Several Weeks before

- Contact bike shop
- Check with the office to make sure blacktop is available
- E-mail other blacktop users, if needed
- First e-mail inquiry to potential volunteers
- E-mail Deputy Chao and Cherie to confirm attendance

Continued

2 weeks before


- Continue monitoring volunteer sign up (can be challenging)
- Apart from parents, potential volunteers could be Middle School students, High School students, Rotary Club. About 16 volunteers are needed.

Thursday before event

- Send out permission slip
- Organize volunteers

Day of the Event

- Set up takes about 1.25 hours
- We use cones from PE/caution tape/and masking tape for the games
- Assign volunteers to their spot (parent volunteers for check in, bike savvy volunteers to help pump and check bikes, middle/high schoolers for games
- Volunteers bring bike pumps
- Have water, small snacks, sunscreen, First Aid items available

- Walking (Garden Gate 35%, Faria 41%)
- Biking (CHS 16%)
- FV (Eaton, Regnart both 65%)
- School Bus (Stevens Creek 9%)
- Carpool (Faria 22%)
- Transit (Homestead 6%)
- Total Alternative Travel (Kennedy 55%, Faria 64%)

SY Reflections- City Wide Events

Summer Family Bike Workshops

 2 Workshops which each included a bike safety presentation, skills drills, and a group bike ride

Fall Bike Fest

- 100 Participants
- 2 Rides (5 mile ride and 14 mile ride)
- Safe Moves provided a bike rodeo that helped teach kids bike handling and safety skills
- Bicycle-pedestrian commissioner Erik Ludwig ran a bike blender non-stop
- Mike's Bikes brought e-bikes for participants to test out
- Calabazas Cyclery provided bike checks
- Walk/Bike Cupertino provided helmet fits
- Girl Scout Troop 60657 painted faces

Earth Day P4PR

- Earth Day Pedal 4 the Planet Family Bike Rides
- Nearly 100 participants
- 2 family friendly bike family friendly routes rides (6 mile route through 3 Cupertino parks and 11 mile route through Blackberry Farms)
- Free bike repairs by the Sports Basement



SY Reflections - Studies and Bicycle/Pedestrian Project Designs

- The first phase of Stevens Creek Boulevard Separated Bike Lanes (between Tantau and Wolfe) are being designed. A temporary pilot will likely be installed Summer 2019. Permanent construction is scheduled for 2020.
- Several legs of the City's Bicycle Boulevard Network are designed. This summer, pop-up bulb-out pilots and permanent speed tables will be installed. Phase 2 work will occur in 2020.
- Regnart Creek Trail feasibility study was presented to council in August and is currently being designed. The 65% design will likely go to council in July.
- Carmen Road Bridge Feasibility Study is currently being conducted.







SY Reflections – McClellan Separated Bike Lanes

- Originally scheduled to break ground in November
- School districts requested input into timing
- New precedent established in terms of work hours near schools and construction communication with families, through collaboration between the City, CUSD and FUHSD









SY Reflections – Bulb-Out Pilot @ CHS

 Two bulb-outs were designed with community input and installed at the corner of Finch and Calle de Barcelona





SY Reflections- Crossing Flag Program Expansion

- Added crossing flags at intersections near Regnart Elementary, Garden Gate Elementary, Kennedy Middle and Lawson Middle School
- We are actively replacing tattered flags with clean new ones
- Our crossing flag program began in Fall of 2016 and we intend to expanding the program to more intersections throughout Cupertino with the help of volunteers



SY Reflections- Wayfinding Signs

- Cupertino began implementing its Wayfinding Sign program to assist residents, tourists and visitors in finding key community destinations by bicycle, starting with the areas around City Hall and Portal Park.
- The City has allocated funds in the Capitol Improvement
 Program for next year to continue implementing the program.



SY Reflections- Walk Audit Implementation

 We will continue implementing our school walk audit recommendations. Some of this work will be included in the City's ongoing pavement maintenance program.

 Apple has also offered to contribute funding for Walk Audit Improvements. Council will consider accepting this gift on

June 18.



SY Reflections- Pogo @ CHS

- Extended carpooling pilot with an app called Pogo Rides at Cupertino High School, which was rolled out mid-year in the 2017-18 school year
- Semi-annual travel tally counts showed a decrease in carpooling at CHS
- Update: City/FUHSD has decided to end pilot





SY Reflections- Walk & Roll Days

Stevens Creek Elementary and Hyde Middle

- These schools hold weekly Walk and Roll Days
- Parents and students engaged and motivated Stevens Creek students to walk and roll to school through stickers, music, bubbles, and the golden sneaker award. They also created a flyer to be distributed to all incoming families next year.

Hyde parents motivated students to walk to school by making banners

and handing out candy as incentive.



SY Reflections- Walk & Roll Days

Lincoln, Regnart and Sedgwick Elementary Schools

- These schools hold a monthly Walk and Roll Day
- Led by Special Programs Coordinators Barbara Frei-Jager at Regnart and Patti Schmidt at Sedgwick







SY Reflections- Walk & Roll Days

Eaton Elementary

- This schools holds a yearly Walk and Roll Day
- Mayor Darcy Paul welcomed the students to school in October 2019



SY Reflections- Bike Stampedes

Homestead High

- This schools held several bike stampedes, encouraging students and teachers to bike to school
- Cyclists were rewarded with chocolates and broccoli, gift cards and bike raffle!





SY Reflections- Walking School Bus

- Faria holds a daily walking school bus


